VIRTUAL CONFERENCE ACCESS AND HOW LONG

Friendly reminder, to access the Virtual Conference, you must access from your desktop computer or laptop. You cannot access it from your mobile device (smart phone or tablet).

The virtual conference is where you access live, simu-live and on-demand sessions – keynotes and workshops. You can also post social feed – similar to Facebook. Engage in private or video chats with another attendee or exhibitors. Join workshop discussion groups or standalone topical discussion groups.

Live = sessions presented fully live including live Q&A with the presenter(s)

Simu-Live = sessions where at least an hour is pre-recorded with live Q&A with the presenter(s)

On-Demand = sessions that are fully recorded (no live Q&A with presenters)

All sessions – no matter what format – will be available ondemand starting Tuesday, April 27 through Friday, June 25.

The virtual conference experience is available through Monday, May 10. After May 10, all Unified Communication – discussion groups, chats and the social feed – will no longer be available.

Your experience is important to us – we've planned this virtual conference with you in mind.

DISCUSSION GROUPS – THERE ARE TWO TYPES

When you log into the Virtual Annual Conference, you can join two different types of discussion groups: those associated directly with a workshop or standalone topics.

Both types of Discussion Groups are available in the virtual experience platform through May 10. After May 10, you will enter the on-demand conference experience through the Attendee Service Center. But don't worry, we will send you an email with the "how-to" after May 10.

Access through the Networking Lounge by clicking on Attendee Lounge. Once you click into the Attendee Lounge, in the left top corner you will see a few options:

- Chat and Discussion

- Keyword Search

When you click on Chat and Discussion Groups, another window in your browser will open and you are directed to the Unified Communication (UC). UC is where you can access:

• Social • Discussion • Private Feed Groups Chat

Social Feed is very much like Facebook – post a message and select a file (such as a photo). To post a message, look to the bottom of your screen, which is where you will see where to start a post.

For the topical Discussion Groups, click on the "+" symbol to the right of Discussion Groups and the list of topical groups and they're access hours appears.

For Workshop Discussion Groups, you will start by accessing them from the Educational Sessions main menu. If you added a workshop to My Agenda, click on My Agenda and you will see the sessions you bookmarked into your schedule. Find the workshop session that you want to join the Discussion Chat. Click on the workshop and it appears to the right. The Discussion Chat button is at the bottom of the workshop description.

Want to get back to the virtual conference? Click on the browser tab to the left of the Unified Communications tab. And just like that you are back in the virtual conference.

In this keynote presentation, we will reflect on the ways we can leave a mark on young children through the relationships we develop with them as well as the ways in which relationships can provide guidance for navigating our journey back toward a post-COVID world as we look ahead.

About Mike Sherman

A licensed clinical psychologist and NAPA/UC Davis IPMH fellow, Dr. Mike Sherman has expert training and experience in Infant / Early Childhood Mental Health. For more than 15 years, he has been involved in community mental health programs, including direct service provision, supervision, training, consulting, program development, and administration.

Dr. Sherman's training, clinical practice, and administrative experience have given him a deep understanding of the needs and barriers in our systems of care. His goal is to broaden the capacity of providers, programs, and systems to foster children's social, emotional, and behavioral health and development.

Dr. Sherman's work is focused on Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health within the national ZERO TO THREE Infant-Toddler Court Team program. In addition, he is an Associate Professor of Forensic and Clinical Psychology at The Chicago School of Professional Psychology and provides continuing education training through the UC Davis Resource Center for Family-Focused Practice. He regularly educates providers on child development, trauma, and the importance of relationships to life-long outcomes.
